4thConference of the International Association for Cognitive Semiotics (IACS4-2020) The Board has spent the last few months working closely with the conference organizers of our next conference, which will be held at RWTH Aachen University, Germany, on July 2-4. There were a few obstacles beyond the organizers' control at the start, but fortunately much has now been arranged and that further preparations are in full swing for what promises to become a terrific conference. Sincere thanks to Irene Mittelberg, and the rest of the local committee at Aachen for all their hard work organizing the conference. A word of thanks is also due to Geert Brône and Paul Sambre from The Catholic University of Leuven, who are kindly assisting the local team. The Conference theme is 'Semiotic Complexities: Theory & Analysis'. A call for papers will be announced shortly. Bursaries and Scholarships for New Researchers

For those concerned about financing your trip, the IACS board is supplying generous funds to support new and early career researchers whose papers are accepted for presentation. Additional funding will be sought by the organizers from the German Research Foundation (DFG), one of the major foundations, such as Volkswagen or Thyssen, and various institutions at RWTH Aachen University. Funding applications are in preparation but can only be submitted once the proposal is more fully developed – prominently including plenary speakers. Funding allocation and amounts awarded will be based on the total funds available.

Membership

The payment systems for IACS membership and conference fees are now integrated, so that your two-year membership dues are factored into the conference fee. As in the past, membership entitles you to a 30% discount on the subscription to the journal <u>*Cognitive Semiotics*</u>.

The Journal

As was discussed at the General Assembly meeting of our last conference in Toronto in 2018, the publisher of the journal <u>*Cognitive Semiotics*</u>. De Gruyter Mouton, decided for the journal to appear in digital form only, due to too low yearly sales of the paper version. Concerns about this decision were expressed by a few members at the General Assembly and at later board meetings.

Esther Pascual (President) communicated these concerns to the two editorial managers at de Gruyter, and suggested in-between alternatives, but unfortunately their decision is final. Disappointment with the new layout of the digital version was also discussed at the General Assembly meeting and later board meetings. The format chosen follows the standard template for other online journals, which are quite inflexible. The publisher may however consider modifying it in the future. Fortunately, the editor-in-chief, Peer Bundgaard assures us that that the layout has not been a problem in the most recent issue of the journal and that the online proof platform works smoothly. The concern about pagination will be taken with the person responsible at de Gruyter by the editors. Matters went slower than usual, due to the fact that there was a change of staff at de Gruyter.

All members are encouraged to submit manuscripts for peer-review and possible publication in <u>*Cognitive Semiotics*</u> at any time. The Editors are also eager to consider special issue proposals of 4-5 papers or more on a relevant topic for 2021 and 2022. We'd further like to ask all members to consider requesting that your university library subscribes to the journal.

A special Issue edited by Göran Sonesson and Peer F. Bundgaard and entitled 'The rhetoric of contemporary metaphor theory', which was primarily based a panel on Metaphor at IACS3 in Toronto, appeared published in *Cognitive Semiotics* last May 2019. Lastly, a themed double issue of *The American Journal of Semiotics* 35.1-2 (2019), entitled 'Cognitive Semiotics' and edited by Jamin Pelkey, Sophia Melanson and Richard Rosenbaum, is currently in press. This special issue includes a selection of eight peer-reviewed articles based on papers first presented to IACS3 held in Toronto in July 2018.

Regarding the further future, the Governing Board is looking forward to reviewing proposals for sites of the next IACS conference in 2022. The Board encourages any interested parties to contact the President or any member of the Governing Board with any suggestions. As is customary, choices for the next and future conference sites will be discussed at the General Assembly at IACS4-2019 in Aachen.

We are sad to remember the sudden passing of esteemed and prolific British semiotician Gunther Kress (26 November 1940–20 June 2019), who contributed greatly to semiotics, as well as multimodality, pedagogy and social thought.
